(INTERNATIONAL STANDARD BOOK NUMBER)

The ISBN (International Standard Book Number) is a unique 13-digit number that identifies one title or edition of a title from one specific publisher and is unique to that edition.

It must be stressed that ISBNs need to be used for every component in a publisher's product line. For example, a CD that accompanies a book must have a separate ISBN as well as supplemental items that might accompany a main volume, an instructor's manual for instance. Publishers should resist the urge to "conserve" their ISBNs by not assigning an ISBN to a unique product or even worse using the same ISBN on different products that may be related but warehoused as separate items. PSSC requires all books to have a scannable ISBN barcode. Non-book products must also have a scannable SKU barcode.

1 What does an ISBN include?

- Publisher: The publisher or imprint that published the book
- Title: The title of the book
- Edition: The edition of the book
- Format: The physical format of the book, such as paperback or hardcover
- Language: The language of the book
- Check digit: A final digit that validates the rest of the ISBN

2 Why is an ISBN important?

- It helps readers, libraries, and retailers find books
- It helps authors market their books and track sales
- It helps establish a book as a unique product in the marketplace
